NEW DEVELOPMENTS

RENAMING OF SGH'S DEPARTMENT OF HAND SURGERY

The Department of Hand Surgery was renamed to Department of Hand and Reconstructive Microsurgery with effect from 1 January 2019 to better reflect its clinical scope and functions. The Department will continue to be helmed by Dr Jacqueline Tan.

RE-ORGANISATION OF SGH'S DIVISION OF OPERATIONS

To streamline the hospital's operations command and control and enhance operational efficiency and response to the evolving and complex needs of the Campus, the Division of Operations has been re-organised into 3 separate functional pillars with effect from 1 January 2019:


- 1. Division of Estate Management, helmed by Mr Tay Kim Say (concurrent with his current role as Director, Facilities Management & Engineering);
- 2. Division of Patient Support, helmed by Mr Geoffrey Gui (concurrent with his current role as Director, Operational Planning & Performance); and
- 3. Division of Service Support, helmed by Mr Joseph Chua.

The re-organization will also right-site Safety Network under the Division of Organisation Planning & Performance. The moves will enable each functional pillar to operate with greater autonomy and accountability, and create professional and leadership development opportunities.

There has also been a leadership change for the Division of Pre-Operative and Admitting Services (POAS), with Mr Lee Jiunn Kee returning to lead POAS with effect from 1 November 2018.

NEW NURSING UNIFORMS

The uniform change is being rolled out progressively across SingHealth institutions starting from 1 January. The new set of SingHealth nursing uniforms is aimed at creating a stronger and more cohesive identity for our nurses across the cluster, enabling our patients and caregivers to better identify the nursing team caring for them. The new uniforms were designed with feedback from 4,800 patients, staff and members of the public, and serve as practical and professional work attire. Each nurse has 2 types of uniforms - a work suit and a formal suit. Both suits can be used in the

RE-DESIGNATION OF KEY COMMUNICATIONS LEADERSHIP APPOINTMENTS

In line with the enlarged and enhanced role of Communications roles at Sing Health that have gone beyond communications and patient experience (service quality) to include development (philanthropy), key Communications leadership positions has been re-designated with effect from 1 January 2019. Group Director, Communications & Service Quality (GD, Comms & SQ) will be re-designated Group Chief Communications Officer (GCCO). This is in alignment with the "Group Chief Communications Officer" designation used in other public healthcare clusters.

GCCO will oversee the Division of Communications at SingHealth HQ comprising Group Communications, Group Marketing Communications, Group Office of Patient Experience and Group Development.

With this change, the designations of Deputy Group Director, Communications, SingHealth and that of the apex Communications Director in Sing Health institutions will correspondingly be re-designated to Deputy Group Chief Communications Officer (DGCCO) and Chief Communications Officer (CCO) respectively.

SHARING BY SGH FELLOWS

Dr Takeshi Yamashita from Japan and Dr Nang San Kyauk Kaw from Myanmar, share their fellowship experience in SGH Department of Upper GI and Bariatric Surgery and Department of Rheumatology and Immunology respectively.

My name is Takeshi Yamashita from Showa University Hospital in Tokyo, Japan. Our department has one of the biggest facilities for Minimally Invasive Esophagectomy (MIE) for esophageal cancer in Japan. There is a good relation between our department and Upper GI and Bariatric surgery. In fact, my boss, Prof. Murakami had performed MIE in SGH 3 years ago.

In April 2018, I started my attachment with the department of Upper GI and Bariatric Surgery at SGH as a Clinical Observer for 4 months, followed by Observer for a month and finally the last 7 months as a Research Fellow.

My main aim for this fellowship is to learn more about Bariatric surgery and to polish up on my English language. Although I knew that SGH is one of the biggest hospitals in Singapore, I was pleasantly surprised that SGH has many operation theatres, nurses, dietitians which is not common in Japan. Beside that, the patients here are also supported

by the Obesity Metabolic Units (OMU) and Life Centre which consists of endocrinologist, nurses, dietitian, physiotherapist, psychologist and surgeons.

The highlight of my attachment is learning Laparoscopic Sleeve Gastrectomy (LSG), which is seeing increasing demands in Japan. LSG is a simple procedure, however, it is not easy to carry out on obese patients. It was very interesting to see LSG for patient whose BMI was 72, because in my experience in Japan the patient's highest BMI was only 38. Beside learning Laparoscopic Sleeve Gastrectomy (LSG), I had the opportunity to pick up Laparoscopic Rouex-en-Y Gastric Bypass (LRYGB) and worked on my laparoscopic suturing skill which I will have to adapt for my department in Showa University. In addition to learning different procedures, I had the opportunity of joining in cadaver training, presenting a case report at the oversea conference, IFSO-APC 2019 and partaking in a research on Bariatric surgery. Last October, I visited Showa university with supervisors from SGH where we watched the procedure of Minimally Invasive Esophagectomy (MIE). After this visit, they have begun incorporating para tracheal lymph node dissection in surgeries and through this, I am glad that we are able to learn from each other.

Despite facing serious issues with immigration pass for my family, my first overseas training has completed successfully. I am deeply thankful to Prof. Murakami, Prof. Aoki, Prof. Otsuka and all members of my department in Showa University for giving me the great opportunity to come to Singapore. To Cynthia from PGMI, thank you for making my first overseas training possible. I am sincerely thankful to Prof. Ong Hock Soo and everyone who taught and helped me in the department and OMU. Special thanks to Dr. Lim Kee Wee Eugene, who always supported me and my family during our stay in Singapore.

I hope to maintain good relation between SGH and our department to inspire young Japanese surgeons to learn in SGH. It has been my pleasure to live in Singapore, where we spent Christmas and New Year in a short sleeve shirt for the first time! Hopefully I will come back to Singapore some time and visit SGH and eat "Char Kway Teow". Thank you Singapore and thank you SGH. •

Why did you choose to apply to Singapore/SGH for your attachment?

Dr Nang: I chose Singapore because Singapore has a strong reputation around the world for being an efficient and excellent healthcare system. Additionally, I was motivated by my senior colleagues whose has been trained in Singapore General Hospital as they all agreed that they received best in value and satisfaction trainings.

Did you face any difficulties during your attachment?

A: Yes. As we have different languages and cultures background, I find it challenging to communicate with the patients which proved to be a barrier to build good rapport with them. Initially I also find it quite difficult to concentrate on my patients' illness as I have to answer their series of questions rather than me asking them. This is not something which my patients back home in Myanmar will usually do. However, with the help of my many supportive colleagues, I was able to overcome these difficulties without facing major problems.

How has the attachment made an impact on you?

Dr Nang: I gained a lot of experiences that are not available in my country because of financial restraint, and availability of up-to-date drugs and investigations. I become familiar to advanced investigations and advanced treat-

ments like biologics and intravenous immunoglobulins. Now, I have more confident in managing life threatening autoimmune diseases. I believed that with this opportunity to polish my professional skills in managing Rheumatologic disorder in SGH, I will be able to serve Myanmar people better and also implement them in shaping Myanmar's health sector.

Do you have any interesting/memorable experience during your attachment?

Dr Nang: : Yes, it is during my birthday celebration with my colleagues. It is a memorable experience that I will not be able to forget. A simple lunch with my close colleagues along with a birthday cake and song is all it takes to make me happy and feel appreciated. Thankfully, all my departmental colleagues and consultants are nice to me especially senior residents and my supervisors. They are more warm, genuine and supportive than I expected. I was inspired by their passion for work with special interests to their patients. Having a chance to learn from such experienced rheumatologists will be one of most valuable experience of my life.

What did you enjoy most during your attachment?

Dr Nang: From a training point of view, the time that I enjoyed most is during grand ward rounds discussions. It is done once a week on Wednesday afternoon. All departmental colleagues will attend and participate in the discussions about patients healthcare management. It is the time that I can learn broad views of rheumatology diseases and different aspects of management of patients. Besides training, I also enjoyed going sightseeing as there are many famous places in Singapore with different good points. As I am interested in beauty and fashion, I also really enjoyed going shopping as there are various kinds of famous and popular brands here.
