NEW DEVELOPMENTS

BVH IS NOW BRIGHT VISION COMMUNITY HOSPITAL (BVCH)

As part of a move to enhance corporate governance, streamline fundraising efforts and optimise its operations, Bright Vision Hospital (BVH) has de-registered as a charity and an Institution of Public Character (IPC). It has also been removed from the register of companies in Singapore.

BVH's hospital operations has been integrated into SingHealth Community Hospitals (SCH) with effect from 1 January 2023, and SCH will run the hospital operations under the new name "Bright Vision Community Hospital". SCH also operates Sengkang Community Hospital and Outram Community Hospital, and is part of the SingHealth cluster, Singapore's largest public healthcare cluster.

This move will bring BVH directly into the SingHealth network of public healthcare institutions and will increase its accessibility to professional resources within the SingHealth cluster, thereby allowing it to better meet the needs of its patients.

NATIONAL CANCER CENTRE SINGAPORE HAS MOVED



NCCS has began operation at the new building with effect from 10th March 2023.

Located just 3 minutes' walk away from Outram MRT station, the new 24 -storey building has increased capacity and expanded facilities dedicated to cancer care, rehabilitation, research and education. Designed with a patient-centric approach, the new NCCS has increased clinic space for multi-disciplinary cancer care and larger capacity to improve patient flow and experience. It also offers patients access to proven, advanced treatments such as proton therapy. Singapore Cancer Society will also be co-located in the same premises.

CREATING MORE MILEAGE FOR KNEES

For younger patients with knee osteoarthritis, new treatment options are available to preserve rather than replace the knees.

Painful arthritic knees are often linked to ageing, but osteoarthritis is increasingly affecting younger people.

A degenerative condition associated with knee malalignment, obesity and sports injuries, osteoarthritis is often treated by taking out the diseased knee bone and replacing it with an artificial part. Someone in his late 30s or early 40s, however,

may need to undergo one or even two more replacements, as the artificial parts last at most 20 years.

To avoid having to undergo several replacements — and the possible infections and complications that come with repeated surgeries — younger patients with early arthritis can opt for knee preservation. This involves shaving a bit of the tibia (shin bone) and adding a bone graft to align and distribute the body weight across the whole knee. In arthritic patients, their body weight tends to shift to one side, causing pain and sometimes, bow legs.

"A preservation surgery not only addresses patients' knee osteoarthritis problem, but may also help them delay or even avoid the need for a knee replacement surgery in the future," said Dr Lee Kong Hwee, Consultant, Department of Orthopaedic Surgery, and Director, Sport Service, Singapore General Hospital (SGH).

Data show that 80 per cent of patients who had undergone a type of preservation surgery known as high tibial osteotomy (HTO) did not need a knee replacement 10 years after the surgery, Dr Lee added. "Should the arthritis advance for whatever reason, the patient can still go for a replacement; that bridge is not burnt,"

said Dr Lee, who also spearheads SGH's Knee Preservation Service, which was set up in 2019.

FELLOWSHIPS & INTERNATIONAL COLLABORATIONS

Dr Yuen Jin Chuen from Malaysia shares his fellowship experience in SGH, Department of Orthopaedic Surgery, Adult Reconstruction Service

What was your impression of Singapore's healthcare industry?

Singapore's healthcare system is considered to be of high quality, with advanced medical technology and well-trained healthcare professionals. I'm impressed with the standard of care and the expertise available for their patients.

Are there any differences compared to the healthcare industry in your country?

The healthcare system of Singapore is funded through a combination of government subsidies and mandatory individual con-

tributions. Meanwhile the healthcare system in Malaysia is organised into two main sectors: the public sector, which is largely funded by the government and is available to Malaysians at a nominal fee as the services are heavily subsidised through general taxation of income. Hence there is limited resource available in the public sector. Meanwhile the private sector, which is largely funded by individuals and provides more specialised and premium healthcare services.

Why did you choose to apply to Singapore/SGH for your attachment?

Because Singapore has a strong reputation around the world for being an efficient and excellent healthcare system. Additionally, by utilizing cutting edge technology being leveraged to ensure accurate diagnosis and the most advanced treatment to ensure the best possible outcome for the patients.

Did you face any difficulties (e.g. culture, language) during your attachment? What were they?

As a Malaysian Chinese, the culture and language was very similar and generally I believe that I assimilated very well and my colleagues and the staff at SGH and PGMI were all very warm and welcoming. I faced no issue communicating with the patient as most of the Chinese from Malaysia able to speak trilingual. Sometimes I even help to translate for my colleague when treating Malay Singaporean who only speak Malay language.

During your attachment, what was a 'typical' day like?

My day would typically start around 7am, and we will have online zoom briefings before I head to the hospital. Depending on the schedule I would either be in clinic or in the operation theatre.

What were your learning experiences?

I was fortunate to be able to learn and perform surgeries under the expert guidance of two senior consultants. Both of them has different methods on approaching the patient as well as different surgical technique and philosophy in performing operation. I able to exposure to conventional kinematic alignment joint replacement surgery, computer navigated joint replacements and robotic technology as well as direct anterior and posterior hip replacements during my training was much appreciated. Although the fundamental science of medicine remains common everywhere, the approach and the management vary.

How has the attachment made an impact on you?

It has opened my mind on the new techniques, skills and advancement of technology in this arthroplasty field. It had change my practise back in Malaysia and upgraded my skill to bring the best possible treatment for my patients.

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Do you have any interesting/memorable experience during your attachment that you would like to share?

My most memorable experience was the first time when my supervisor suddenly pass me the surgical blade after finish draping the patient, and my supervisor ask me to start the operation when I never expect I be preforming the operation in my early stage of fellowship. It also very memorable when both of my supervisor given me a warm farewell lunch toward the end of my training.



What did you enjoy most during your attachment?

I enjoyed the most went my trainer allow me to perform the operation under his excellent guidance. I really appreciated the opportunity and trust given to me . As to my knowledge, some of my colleagues who underwent fellowship training elsewhere, they were not given such an opportunity to perform the procedure.

Would you recommend SGH to interested fellows? Why?

Definitely yes because I felt I benefit to the max in this fellowship training as well as given so many opportunity to perform many hands-on surgery.

How would you describe your fellowship experience in 3 words?
